## Russia Attack on Ukraine

#### What's Happening?

Since our last edition the situation between Russia and Ukraine has progressed to the use of military force against Ukraine. An explanation on why Russia is so interested in Ukraine can be found on page 8 of the February edition of the Tartan Times. Tuesday, Putin recognized the two breakaway regions from Eastern Ukraine: Donetsk and Luhansk. On Wednesday the 23, Putin declared he would be launching a military operation against the " genocide" he claims has occurred in the Kyiv than ten minutes after region. Less announcement, missile attacks were launched on Ukrainian cities . All across Russia, anti-war protests have broken out leading to many arrests and further restriction of the media.

#### How will this affect Canada?

It is likely that the price of gas and food will go up in the coming weeks. The price of corn and wheat products in particular because Russia and Ukraine produce 25 percent of the world's global production. Canada has also declared we will be welcoming refugees.

# International Women's Day

Along with the changing seasons and the steadily rising temperatures, March holds many commemorative days on all sorts of important themes and topics. This month is not only marked by the return of spring but also by the many days it has dedicated to civil issues all around the world, including women's rights. International Women's Day, celebrated March 8th, acknowledges the contributions numerous women have made throughout history, as well as the struggles they faced, and are still facing, on the path to equality.

International Women's Day is a celebrating everything women have accomplished throughout history, both the well-known and the obscure. But this day would've never even existed without the involvement of Clara Zetkin and her peers. Zetkin was considered a leader and a pioneer in many of the socialist movements in Germany during her lifetime, and on top of that she was heavily involved in the German women's movement during the late 19th to early 20th centuries. Zetkin viewed socialism as the key to ending the oppression of women and she was one of the few people to champion equal rights for women in the working class, as many feminists of the time were focused on the lives of women of higher status. Possibly inspired by protests

happening along the East coast of the United States, Clara Zetkin, together with other female activists such as Käte Duncker and Paula Thiede, were some of the first people to propose a day dedicated to women. It is due to the determination and hard work of Clara Zetkin and all the women like her that March 8th can be celebrated in acknowledgment of the progress that has been made towards women's equality over time.

The first International Women's Day (at the time called only Woman's Day) was celebrated on March 19, 1911, instead of the 8th, with more than a million women participating across Austria. Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland. Over the next three vears, the date would be finalized as March 8th in 1914 as Woman's Day began to be recognized by more and more countries. Woman's Day wouldn't happen again until after World War I, and for many years Woman's Day would predominantly be observed in socialist countries. On March 8, 1975, Woman's Day would be recognized internationally by the United Nations and would be declared International Women's Day the following year.

But there is still a long way to go towards total equality for women everywhere. Thousands of women to this day are stuck in positions where they feel voiceless and alone. It takes more than simply an international day to address the system's people treat failure to especially when that inequity has been going on for so long. With the rise of fourth-wave feminism and intersectionality, it is now more important than ever to remember that all people deserve respect, no matter who they are or what they look like.





# The Campbell Tartan

Campbell Collegiate is a school with a deep connection to many areas of scotland. The most important part of this, in my opinion, is our mascot, the tartan. What's a tartan? A tartan is a criss cross of vertical and horizontal bands of color, used traditionally in Scotland in the creation of kilts. The colors and patterns of a tartan were also used as representations of the many different clans, all throughout Scotland. Clan Campbell, who the school is named after, is an incredibly well known Scottish clan as they were feared for their dominance of the Scottish

highlands. Although we are named after clan Campbell, Campbell Collegiate has an officially recognised tartan in the Scottish registry of tartans. In 2011, Campbell had a tartan woven in green and gold to represent Saskatchewan. This tartan is restricted to Campbell and can only be used with Campbell's permission. There is currently a piece of it preserved in the national records of Scotland.

# International Bagpipe Conference

Bagpipes are the official national instrument of Scotland and are incredibly well known for their unique shape and sound. They have been an integral part of Scottish history for hundreds of years, and the 'tartan pipes' remain an important part of Scottish traditions and music. Originally an instrument for battle, bagpipes can reach over 120 decibels and can be heard up to 16km away. This makes them dangerous not only for those listening to it but for the player and their instrument. Bagpipes are part of the woodwinds family, although the reed is not located in what is known as the 'blowing pipe', but in the three drone pipes, creating its unique sound. To play, the player blows through the pipe continually to inflate the 'lung' or the 'bag' of the bagpipe, this 'airbag' then collects and expels the air through the 'drone pipes', the long black or brown pipes sticking out of the bag, which hold multiple reeds. To control the amount of air in the bag, an arm is pressed around it, both to hold it and to create pressure. Lastly, the final pipe is the chanter, which is the higher pitched pipe that allows the player to control the melody. Due to the amount of air needed to play, the bagpipes are also known as the third lung and are known to have caused players lung infections if not cleaned properly. All together, bagpipes are probably some of the oddest instruments you can commonly come across in the world.

At this time the government was calling us to travel to Canada. My parents rejected the idea, but my grandmother convinced my parents that I should go out and study العنال . We had no language and everything was hard. Now we have learned and got used to the atmosphere and found friends. My life has become so much better than before.

I am Abdalwahab and I am from Sudan. I live in Canada in Regina. I am 17 years old. I have four brothers and one sister. My favorite sport is soccer and my favorite soccer player is Neymar Jr. My favorite team is Atletico Madrid. My favorite season is summer. In Summer, if I don't have school or something to do, I will go with my brothers to play soccer with our friends.

I will go back to my country someday. I need to call my cousin, but I can't because my cousin doesn't have a phone. In Sudan I have many friends because we all went to the same school in my town. In Sudan I lived in a lot of cities like Port Sudan, Kassala and Khartoum. My mother's family lived in Port Sudan, but now Port Sudan has fighting so my mother's family moved from Port Sudan to Khartoum. It is good. My mother has three brothers and no sisters. They are my

uncles. Two of them went to Saudi Arabia. One of them stayed in Sudan. He is single. One of my uncles in Saudi Arabia is married and one is single like his older brother. The married one has two kids. One is a boy and one is a girl. I have never seen his kids. Before they were born I was in Canada. I just see them in the phone. I didn't go to his wedding because I was in Canada. If we were in Sudan, the first thing we would have done was go to his wedding. We would have had a lot of fun with my mother's family. The last wedding I went to in Sudan was in my town with my brother, my dad, and his sister. The last day with my friends and cousins was my uncle and aunt's wedding. I remember my cousins on that last day. I saw them when I left the town for the bigger city in Sudan. Good night people.

My name is Yaen, I'm 15 years old. I like many things, but I don't love them for a long time.

I want to find something to love for a long time, but I can't find it, 太糟糕了.

You do not have the same language and culture. The difficult thing in Canada is when you mai wax dangal. It is very difficult to live. In my future I want to be a nurse and a good mustapleal wanaagsan, but life is sometimes difficult. wan Sunday I make good waanku.

It was very difficult for me to move to different countries with different people. My uncle, my grandmother and my grandfather died in the war in Somalia. My dad was the only one alive there. My dad ran away from the war. At moments he lived alone because he didn't have family. He was all alone. Imagine living without anyone, alone and he was 12 years old. When he told me that story I cried. My father went to Diibouti because he needed to start a new life there. Finally, he met my mom. Aabe helped a lot because he have us and he is so helpful. My father and mother lived in Somalia. They left Somalia because Somalia had a war. My parents married in Djibouti and my siblings and anaga were born in Djibouti. hadda wada life together was sometimes hard and sometimes easy. My grandmother lived with us gudeha Djibouti. She was so cool. Suddenly we moved to Canada. I really miss her. I wish she was here. I want to see her but I can't. Alx alors aid.

# International Women's Day Panel Review

On March 2nd, 2022, the Girl's Group of Campbell Collegiate took it upon themselves to host an International Women's Day Panel to highlight the importance of female empowerment in our school community. I was one of about 30 students to attend this 'come one come all' session where topics like confidence, sexism, female representation and mentorship were discussed.

Although the inspiration I felt while listening to the stories of these 5 Campbell staff members can not easily be put in words, the quotes I recorded in this lunch period are ones that I believe are of paramount importance.

In a moderator proposed prompt, the women in this panel were asked how they include and uplift women in their workplace. Mrs. Holota, one of the

three adept women who run Campbell Collegiate was first to make a comment saying that "[she] reflects on all the voices she talks to". Mrs. Holota says that with every challenge one has overcome and every belief one has expressed, it is key to acknowledge the fact that bits and pieces of what allowed you to succeed were attributed to the people around. In addition to this and in reference to the fact that it wasn't long ago that women were not even considered near equals to men, Mrs. Nagel commented that women should "remember where we [come] from, what we had to go through, [and] what we had to do to get where we are today". Ms. Harrison added to this statement by saying this kind of inequality meant that "[she] never had male representation in physical education roles" - her aspiration since a young age - but because of our society's development "we see more and more of it now"

In a question concerning how these women find the confidence to carry themselves in the proud and strong manners they do, Ms. Harrison and Mrs. Nagel ented complimentary statements:

"Confidence isn't always a perfect reflection inside as compared to how it is seen outside. Confidence is a combination of hard work, dedication, and resilience in expectation"

"Bad things can't just happen to other people. So what are you gonna do about it?

- Push through, even if you have to fake it until you make it"
- -Mrs. Nagel

Once these two women had shared their opinion, Ms. Sexon gave advice to those in search of their own confidence (that I suggest all people should carry with them);

"Confidence means surrounding yourself with people who embody the qualities you want in yourself." She explained that if we are around people we aspire to be, naturally the aspirations will carry on to us. Confidence is contagious.

Mrs. Marchtaler is an arts teacher at Campbell College. In an empowering story, she revealed that she was often talked down to by her former male colleagues while working in a wood

shop - as it was an almost fully male populated field. Marchtaler admits that even though she had often found herself 'at a low', she found a way to put things into perspective by asking herself: "Am I going to feel like this for a month? No. Am I going to feel like this for the week? No. I might feel like this for the day, but I can't let it stifle me." She adds, "No matter what, I am better off than I was yesterday. That's why I allow myself to make mistakes.

Ms. Sexon had a similar story, as she told the audience of her high school years she said that as a person of color in her high school's dominantly white speaking french program she felt "disconnected". She admits that she has been asked: "Wow! Your French is so good! How did you learn it?". The whole audience agreed on the condescending nature of this comment, even if it was unintentional. Because of small but recurring jabs like these, Ms. Sexon often found herself questioning her own abilities, "If they are shocked in your abilities, it means they doubted you. If they doubted me, shouldn't I doubt myself?". To combat these feelings Ms. Sexon advised all women to "Concede to your own well being.". This quote carries a punch that uplifted Sexon through high school and university and she continues to return to it if she is ever hesitant of herself.

As a young highschool student myself, I found that this panel was riveting enlightenment. I have to say, I was shocked as I felt the passion and attention emanating from every student looking at each of the five heartening, motivating and humanizing speakers. The panel was attended by strangers, perhaps coming in pairs or small groups, but unbeknown to us, we were all linked in a common goal as we left the seminar that day: empowerment. I would like to personally thank everyone involved in the organization of this event, as I personally feel that I now have a community to connect to and confide in. It is important to hold panels like this one because I now know there are others who feel the same wav I do.

I would like to leave you with one more quote, from Mrs. Nagel:

"If not me, who? Be in charge of your own story."

# Interview with Mr and Mrs. Nagel

In all reality, this was supposed to be a part of the Valentine's issue, a sort of "Let's get an insight into what it's like to be married and work together" but that kind of morphed into an insight into Mrs. Nagel. We got to hear amazing advice from her during the International Women's day panel in regards to her professional life and her failures and successes as a woman in this profession, so why not discuss her personal life? Why not get further insight into what's shaped Mrs. Nagel to be the woman that she is today. During our interviews we discussed everything ranging from, her path that has led her to working here in Campbell, her and Mr. Nagel's relationship and how it impacted her personal and professional life as well as her opinions about relationships in general, even delving into the kind of advice she would give to students that are transitioning into highschool or that are looking into finding relationships in highschool.

I actually had only met Mrs. Nagel exactly 2 times before approaching her for this article. I've never been in any of her or Mr. Nagel's classes so I really knew nothing about what kind of interview this would turn out to be. Armed with nothing but anxiousness and the thought of 'why am I even doing this?', I started off the interview by simply asking about how Mr. and Mrs. Nagel actually met. Here's what I found out; Mr and Mrs. Nagel first met in 1999 when she started working at the school where he was teaching. After a year of working there, Mrs. Nagel hadn't been hired on yet so Mr. Nagel suggested that she travel to Japan (he had actually lived and taught in Japan years earlier when he was younger) and she did. She moved to Japan for over a year where she taught at an English school that had been founded by her friends and it wasn't until that she came back to Canada that she and Mr. Nagel reconnected, and it was by complete accident too. When Mrs. Nagel came back to Canada; she was hired at Harlack School for Grade 8 and in October of that year she ran into Mr. Nagel while out with friends. They got to talking about Japan and her time there and then they started dating! They actually celebrated 17 years together on Mar 6, 2022!

One thing that Mrs. Nagel doesn't want anyone feeling is that her and Mr. Nagel are a united front, at least not professionally. Because while they are married, they still want to be viewed as their own people at school. Actually, Mrs. Nagel said that she and Mr. Nagel rarely see each other during the school day because they work in such different fields and in different spots in the building and it's a very big school. If Mr. Nagel goes through the line at lunch, then they might have a quick chat but if they ever want to get a hold of each other they resort to what all teachers do, they email one another. They don't have any conflicts of interests and their relationship doesn't impact their co-worker dynamic at all, because they don't really see one another at school. Working together has allowed for them to help each other out in ways such as, when the pandemic hit

they were able to brainstorm ideas for virtual learning together because they understood what the other person's day looks like. Mrs. Nagle actually enjoys the individuality of their different types of professions while still working together because then there's less of a chance for them to be viewed as a 'voting block'.

There is one piece of advice where Mr. and Mrs. Nagel were in agreement with one another over, students shouldn't date until at least grade 11. Dating in grade 9, when you've just moved to a brand new school with dozens of new students isn't the best idea. You're just trying to find your place in a bigger school, adjusting and trying to fit in, making new friends, getting used to different ways that classes would work. It's a transitional grade that you should use to focus on figuring things out for yourself. When you get into a relationship in high school and something were to happen, unless you have a strong foundation in your friendshsips, your friend group will feel obligated to pick a side then you might be subjecting yourself to further hurt that you could be spared form if you focused on school for the first year and a half in highschool. Because in that time period you can also get to know all the people around you. You have the time to get to know what they're like in class, out of class, outside of school, with friends and even in stressful situations. Being in a relationship, even a highschool relationship, isn't something that should be treated lightly. You should pick a good person to trust. But you also have to have experiences and make mistakes so you can learn from them as you grow older.

I thought that was some pretty good advice from Mrs.Nagel and paired with all that I found out but who she is, I think that the interview was a success. This article may have taken some turns away from what it was intended but I'm happy with the outcome and I hope you guys enjoyed reading this too.

#### Fun Facts:

While working together in 1999 they actually discovered that between 1992-1996, while Mrs.Nagel was a highschool student here at Campbell, in his early twenties Mr. Nagel had been a coach at Campbell for all of 1 year, and while Mrs. Nagel was a student here during that time, their paths had never once crossed.




# Movie Reviews

# **Uncharted**
